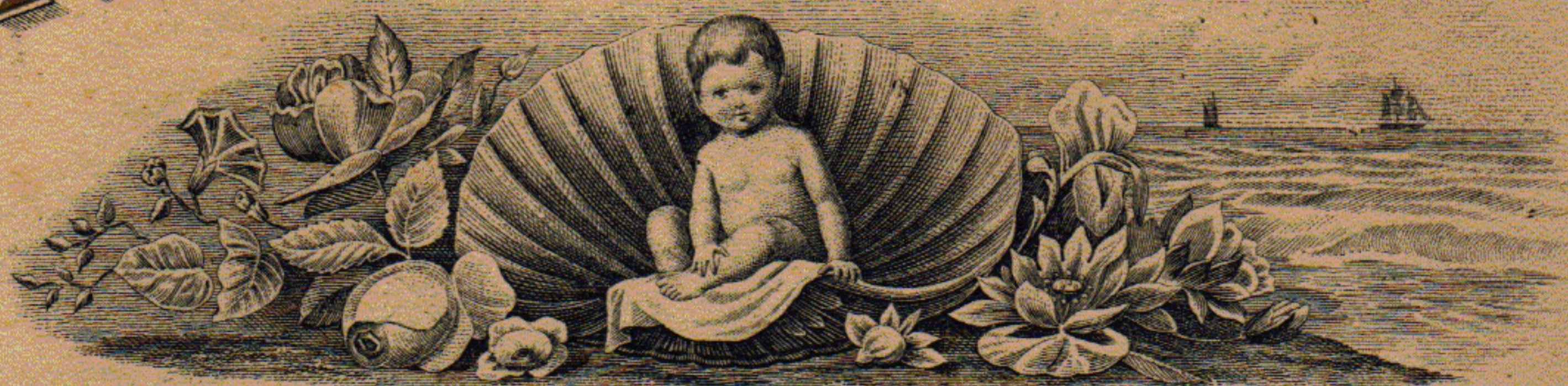

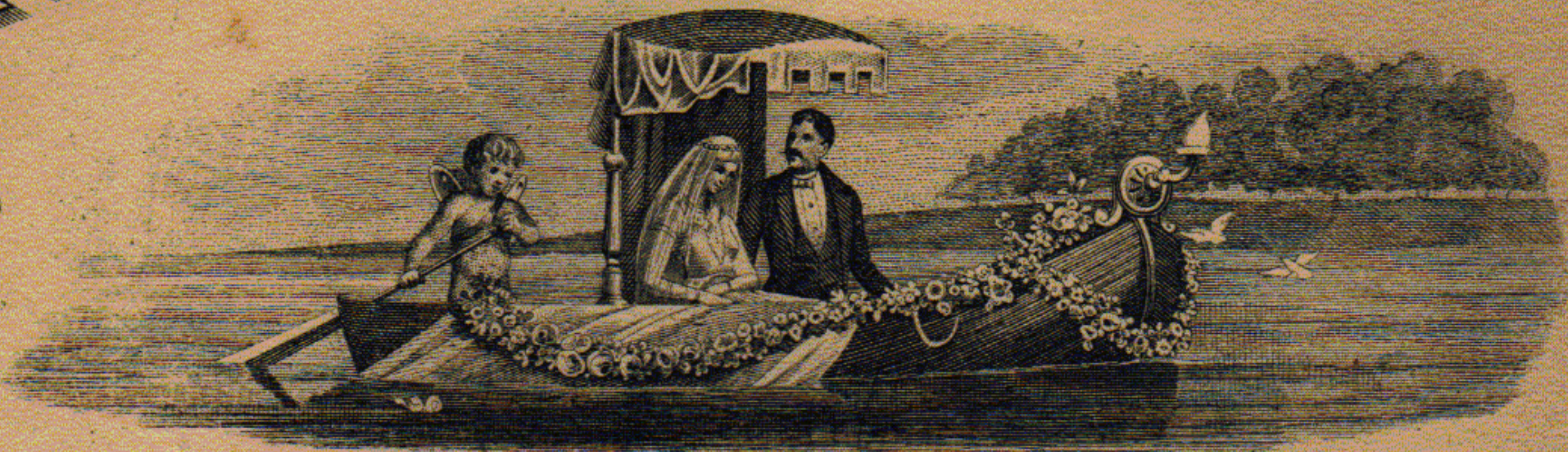

WHY SIGN THE PLEDGE BECAUSE

1. Moderate drinking tends to drunkenness, while total abstinence directly from it.
2. While no one means to become a drunkard, there is said to be over six hundred thousand confirmed drunkards in our country to-day.
3. Intoxicating drinks can do no good as a beverage, and there are always safer and surer remedies to use in case of sickness.
4. The idea of moderation is full of deceit, and our estimate of the power of our own will is usually a mistaken one.
5. The drinking habit is the cause of the larger portion of the misery, poverty and crime in our land.
6. Both science and experience prove that even moderate drinking is injurious to health.

WHY SIGN THE PLEDGE BECAUSE

7. Eternal interests are often forfeited through drink, for the Bible declares that no drunkard shall enter heaven.
8. The Bible pronounces no blessing upon drinking, but many upon total abstinence.
9. It is easier to keep a pledge publicly, solemnly given than a simple resolution.
10. The pledge protects us from the solicitations of friends and removes us from the temptations of the saloon.
11. Persons miscalculate their ability to drink in moderation, and become slaves to the drinking habit before they are aware of it.
12. Intemperance obstructs civilization, education, religion and every useful reform.

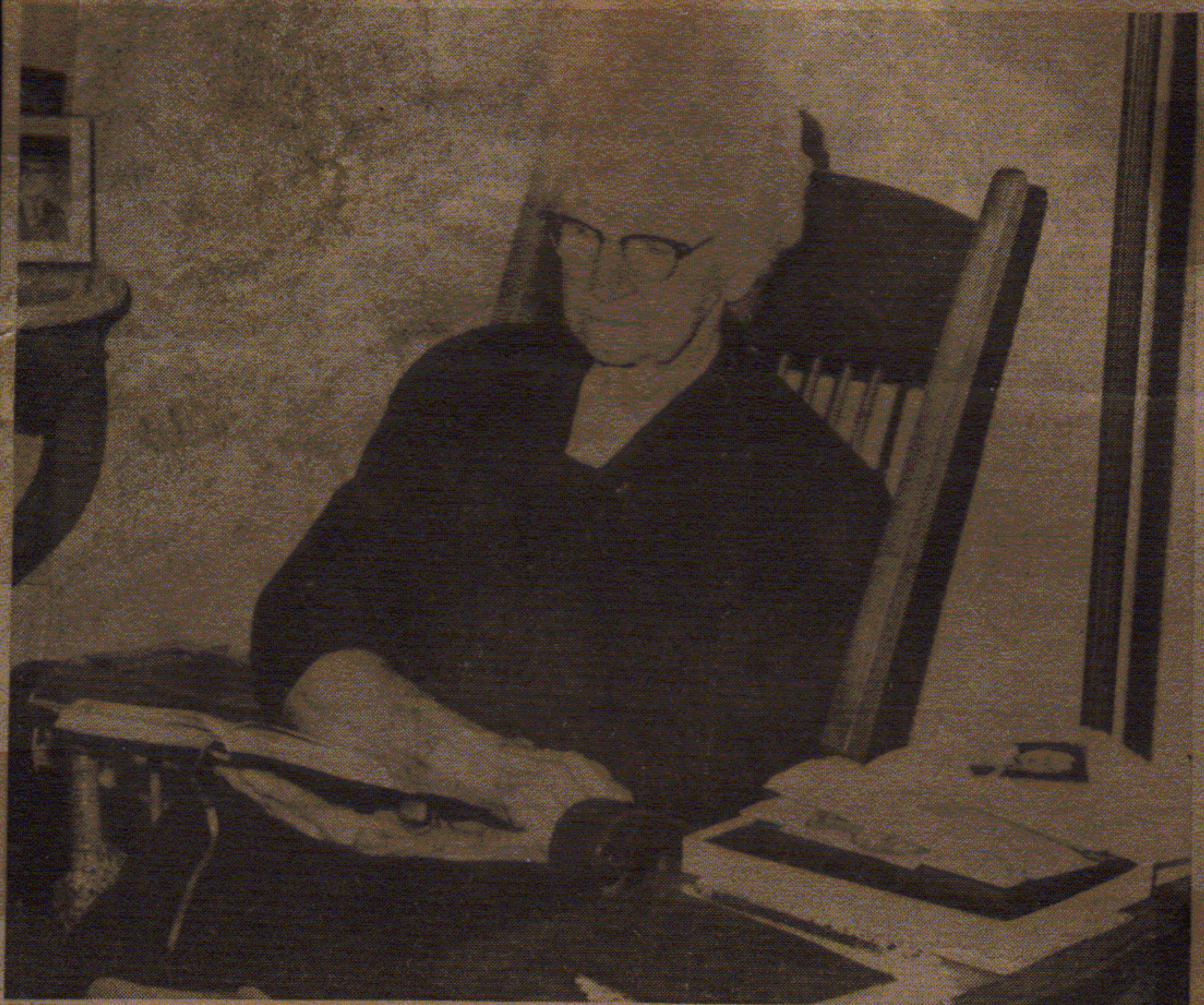

Saline County Lady Shares

Some Golden Memories

Someone said that melancholy is the pleasure of being sad. Sometimes I sigh, and sometimes I smile, but I keep each olden, golden while, — All to myself. Miss Elizabeth Vardeman, last of a family of 11 children, thinks she has kept some golden whiles all to herself a little too long. Now she feels others might find this story interesting.

There were six boys and five girls in the family of Reverend and Mrs. J. T. Vardeman, Baptist minister. Sole survivor Elizabeth was born at Stanhope (out by the Alva Gauldin settlement) November 5, 1887, and attended the Robert Lee School north of Marshall.

Experiences

Miss Vardeman recalls experiences had while employed by E. M. Wright's dry goods store for some 25 years. Later she worked for the Missouri Valley department store for about 12 years. But she feels a better story is the one involving some old papers and documents processed in the days when land was sold as so many poles from the middle of the large rock in the creek to the apple tree to the west; then so many poles to the black jack tree northward.

What's a pole? A pole is a rod. What's a rod? A rod is 16½ feet in length. You mean you had a college education and didn't know about measuring by poles? Don't feel

too badly. I didn't know it either.

Indentures or contracts were written (usually) in clear Spencerian script back in the 17th and 18th century. Papers discolor with age and wear at the folds. The old indenture covering the sale of some Kentucky land is given as accurately as possible under the circumstances, but where it cannot be deciphered, I will insert an ellipsis (. . .). Quote —

This indenture made this 18th Febuary (sic) in the year of our Lord 1867 between Mrs. Elizabeth Redding of the County of Shelby and State of Kentucky of the first, and John T. Vardiman of the County and State aforesaid of the second part witnesseth;

April 24, 1971

Saline County . . .

(Continued from Page One)

That the party of the first part for and in consideration of the sum of Two Thousand Dollars, One Thousand on or before the 1st of September next, the balance, One Thousand 1st of September 1863, have granted, bargained and sold, and by these presents do convey to the said party of the second all that track or parcil of land situated and being in the County and State aforesaid and bounded as follows to wit, beginging at a stone corner to Peter Vardiman thence S 89½ E 86 poles to two beeches corner to said Vardiman, thence S ¼ E 43½ poles to a stone in the middle of a Branch corner to said Vardiman and in Henry Bohannons line. Thence down the branch (creek?) and with

it meanders N 82¼ E 50 poles N 63 E 42 poles S 79½ E 23 ½ poles to three sycamores at the mouth of the branch, on the bank of the Indianfork of Benson (Creek?) on the west side of the creek corner to Henry Bohannons. Thence N 12½ W 32 poles to a poplar on the east side of the Creek. Thence up the middle of the creek and with it meanders N 37 W 37½ poles, N 20¼ W 26 poles N 3½ E 177 poles to a stone in the middle of the creek, N 20¼ W 26 poles, N 3½ E 30 poles N 7½ W 21.2 poles to a stone in the middle of the creek, thence S 87¼ W 26.9 poles to a beech. Thence S 1 W 12 to a beech thence S 1½ E — poles to Peter Vardiman's corner, thence up the branch S 69 W 39 poles to a stake near a beech. Thence S 1 W 12 poles to a beech, Thence corner to Peter Vardiman. Thence S 81½ W 37 poles to a stone near a drain corner to Vardiman thence N 70 W 19 poles to an apple tree corner to Vardiman. Thence S 58½ W 48 poles to a stone in the Spring branch corner to Vardiman, thence S 26 E 17 poles to beginning containing 113 acres one quarter and 11 poles. . . .

The document is signed "Elizabeth Redding" and has

a hand - cancelled United States \$2 conveyance internal revenue stamp attached to make it real legal. Sorry that took so long but thought you'd be interested in the way descriptions were made of properties in that day. We left off the final couple of paragraphs.

Items Sold

Later on some investigation must have been made of property in Saline County near Fairville, or in Fairville, and apparently J. T. Vardiman planned to move this way since he held a sale February 28, 1882. Not all of the items will be listed, but a few of the items sold, according to the sale clerk's recording, involved a sausage mill for 40 cents; a coffee mill for 10 cents.

A set of plates for 40 cents; a dish, 50 cents; a small bed sted, \$1.85; a shotgun, \$3.10; a bed sted, \$3.55; another for \$4.10; a sacking chair, 65 cents; a coffee pot, 5 cents; Washboard, 20 cents; a stove, \$2.60; 15 pounds of lard, 25 cents; they gave the lard can away free; three barrels, 5 cents; a table, \$7; two bed steds, \$3.55 and \$4.10; a saddle, \$1.60; a cradle, 55 cents; scythe and cradle, \$1.70; axe and wedge, 50 cents; two hoes, \$1.50; one crosscut saw, \$3.75; one white cow, \$36.25 on a note; one roan cow, \$37; one gray horse, \$57.50; one gray mare, \$86.50.

One R. plow, \$1; one double shovel, \$2.45; doubletree and single, 10 cents; one single tree, 5 cents; one set harness, \$6.90; one wagon, \$32; six shoats, \$4.10; one bucket, 15 cents; one tub, 40 cents.

A John T. Vardiman letter datelined Oct. the 2nd, 1882, Fairville, Saline County, Mo., written to Mr. Rogert Rogers (apparently never mailed) he says, quote —

Dear Sir: According to promise I will pen you a few lines — We are all well at this time, but Jerry who has the chills, we have all had them some but Hiram though they have not hurt us much yet. Crops of all kind are good in this county. I think I have 60 bushels of corn to the acre which is worth 35 cents per bushel in field. Cattle and hogs are about as high in price as they are in Ky. Hogs 7 & 8 cents; cattle 3 to 5. Land is worth from \$20 to sixty per acre. You can buy improved land here at \$40 per acre that will raise as much corn wheat oats rye hemp and tobacco as any land in Shelby County, Ky.

But it will not grow without work as perhaps you have often heard it would. I am living about eight miles from Marshall, the County Seat of this county. But I can drive to Marshall and back as quick as I could go from where I lived in Ky., to Bagdad and back.

I have been doing most all kinds of work since I laid my crop by. Have had employment all the time at good wages. I am going to overseeing the making of roads tomorrow at \$32 per month. Will, I expect, be at this until cold weather.

About as to how I like the county, will say that I expect to make Mo. my home. As to society, it is not like that in Ky., but as I get better acquainted I like the people better. Now I would not advise anybody to move here until they had come and seen the County for themselves. Though I would say this to you — if you could sell your farm for \$30 per acre you would do well to do it and buy land here at \$40 per acre. Land is advancing here in price fast, but I have not space to write anymore this time. Nellie and children all send love to Beatie and the children. Give my love to all and don't fail to write. Your Friend, John T. Vardiman.

Yup, one looks back on those times and recalls the hardships those folk had and you get to feeling melancholy — but melancholy is the pleasure of being sad, isn't it.

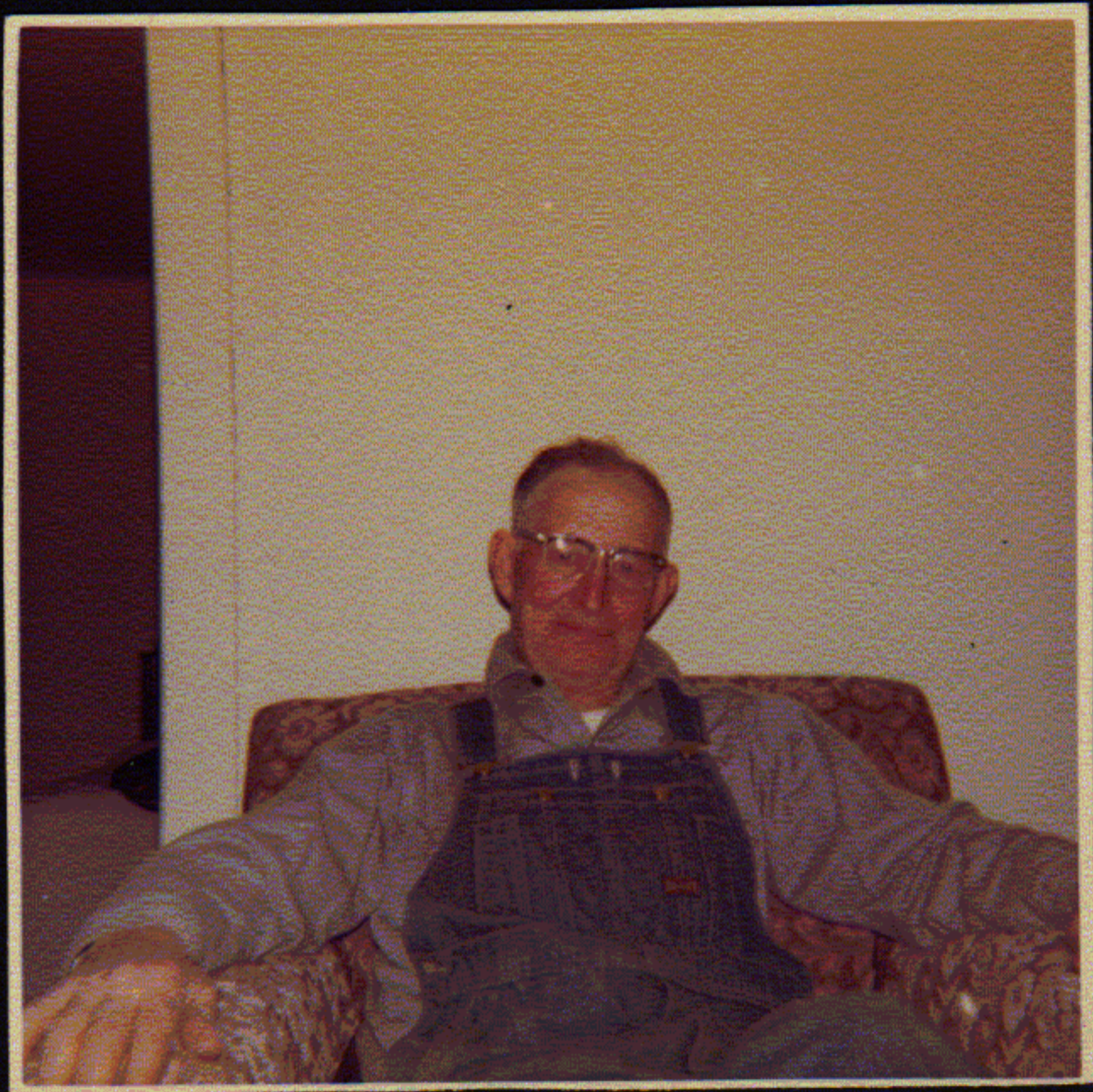

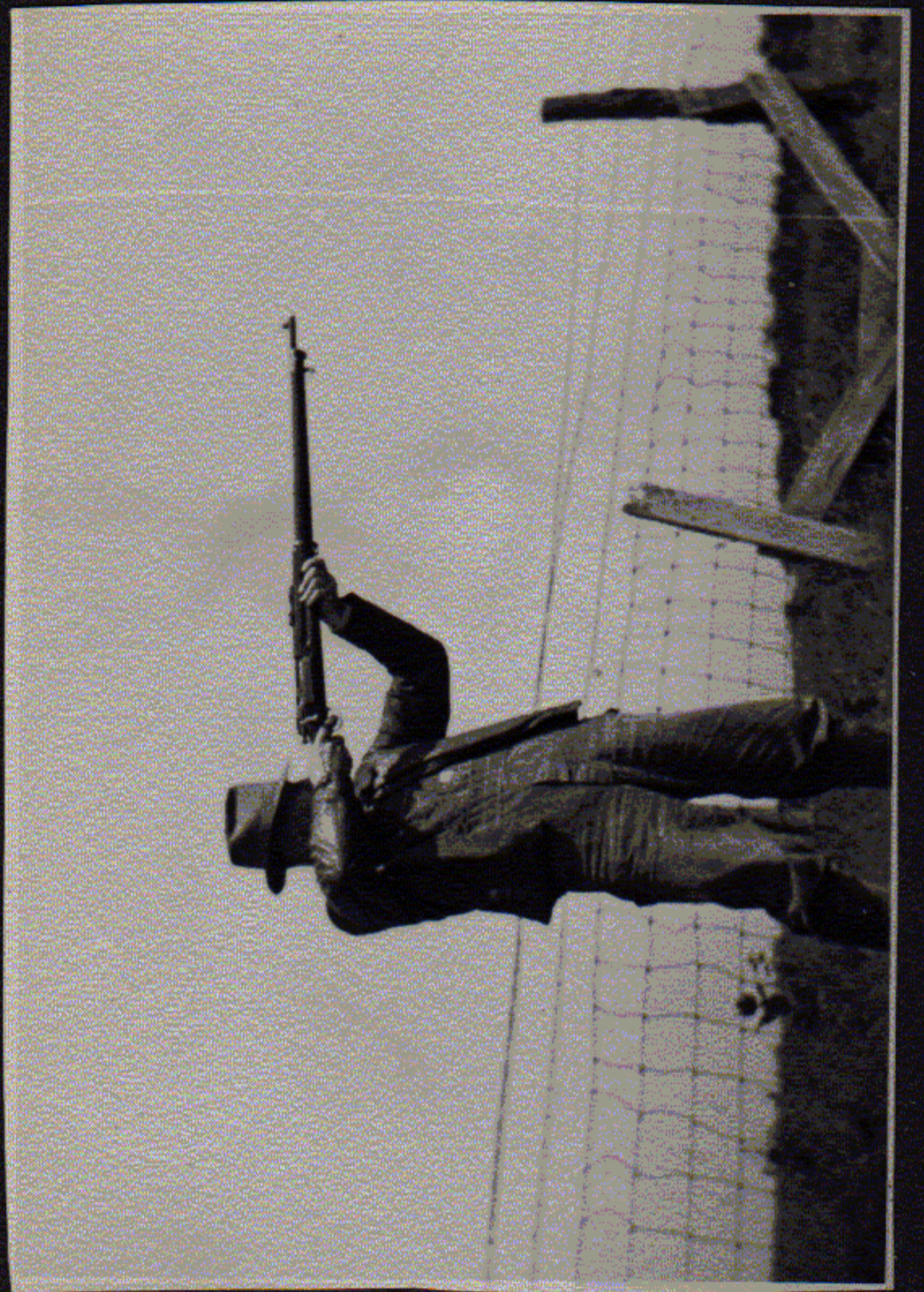

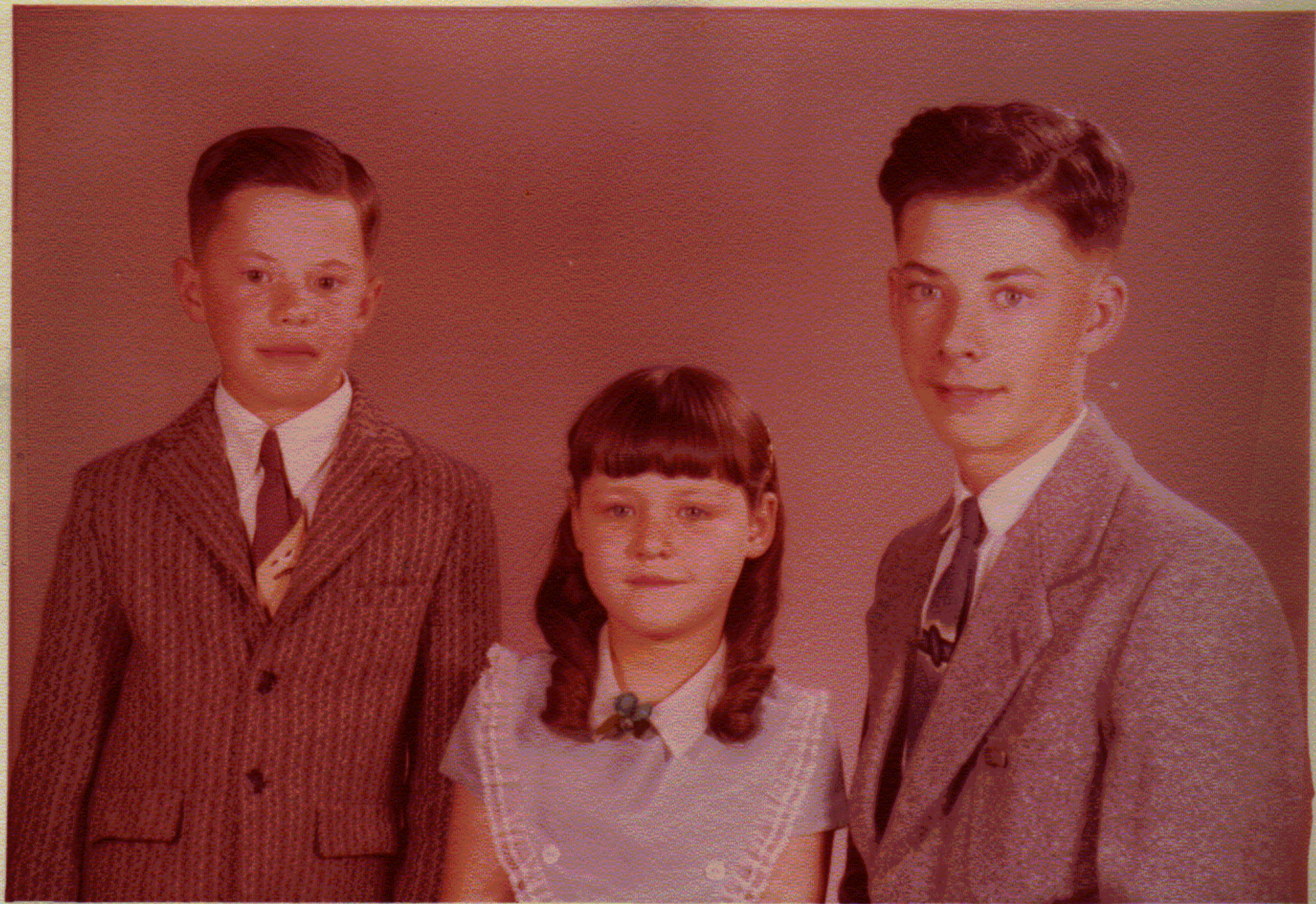

Miss Frances Laura Vardeman, 80, 169 West Summit, died Monday evening in Fitzgibbon Hospital.

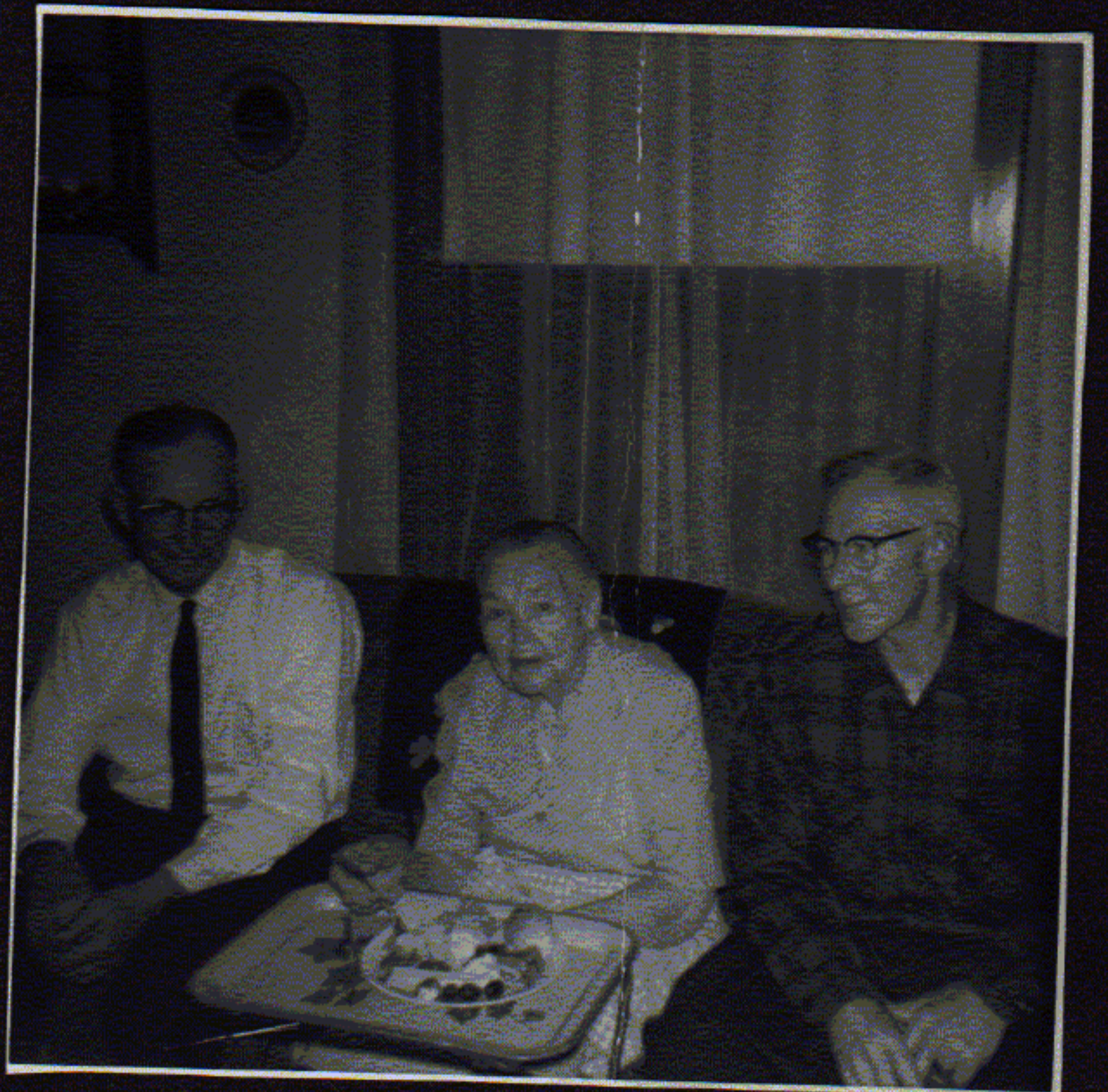

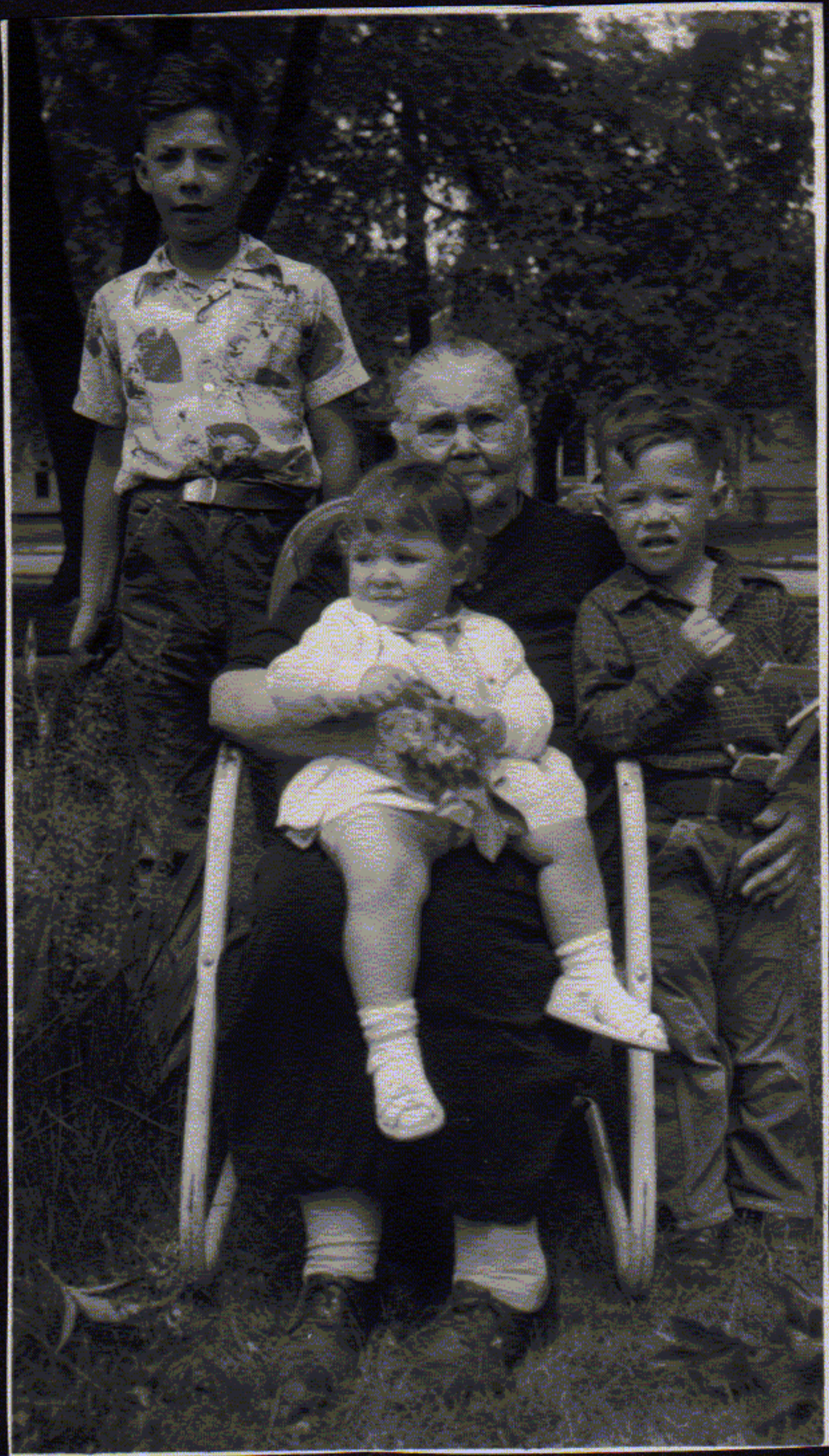

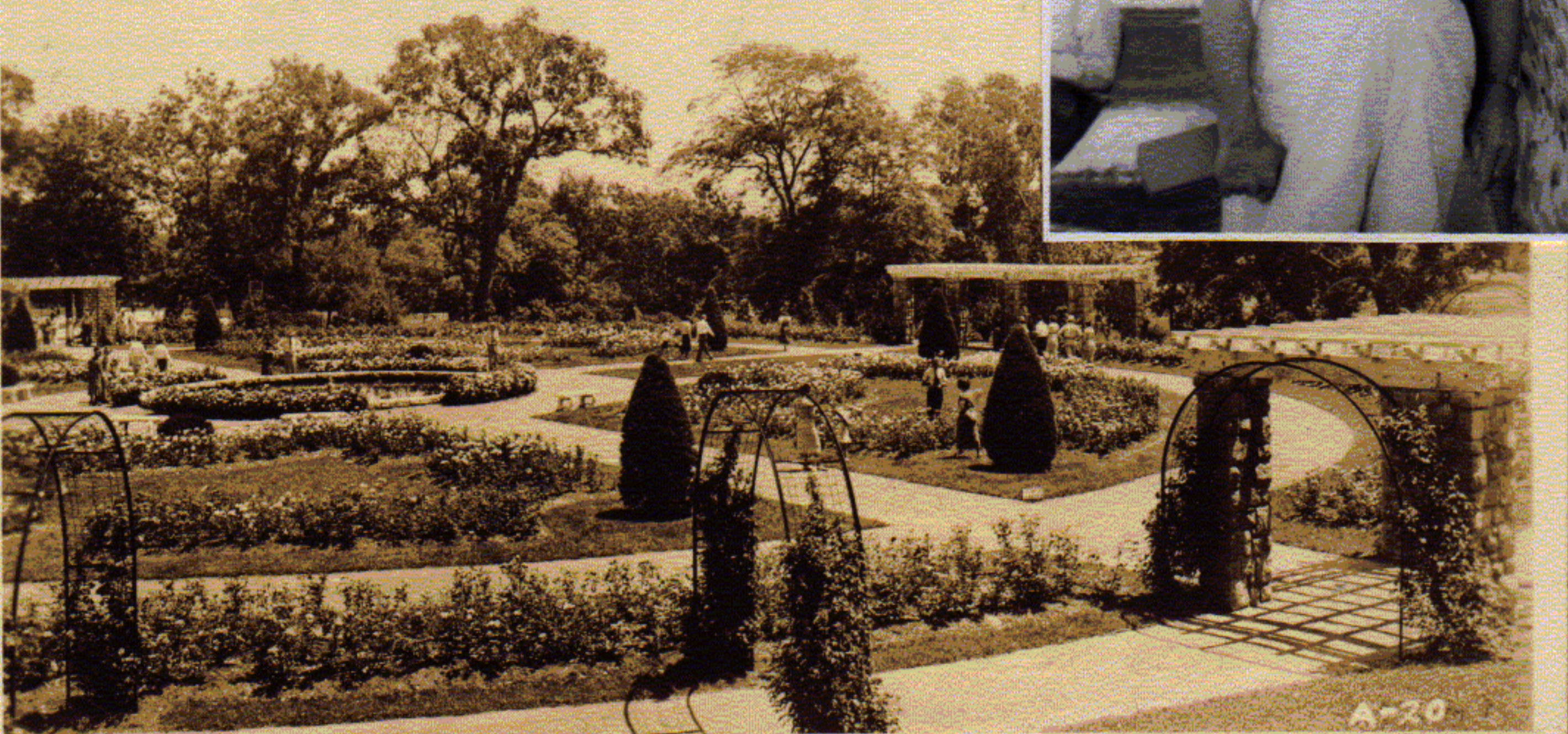
Surviving are a sister, Miss Elizabeth Vardeman, Marshall; a number of nieces and nephews and great nieces and nephews and many friends.

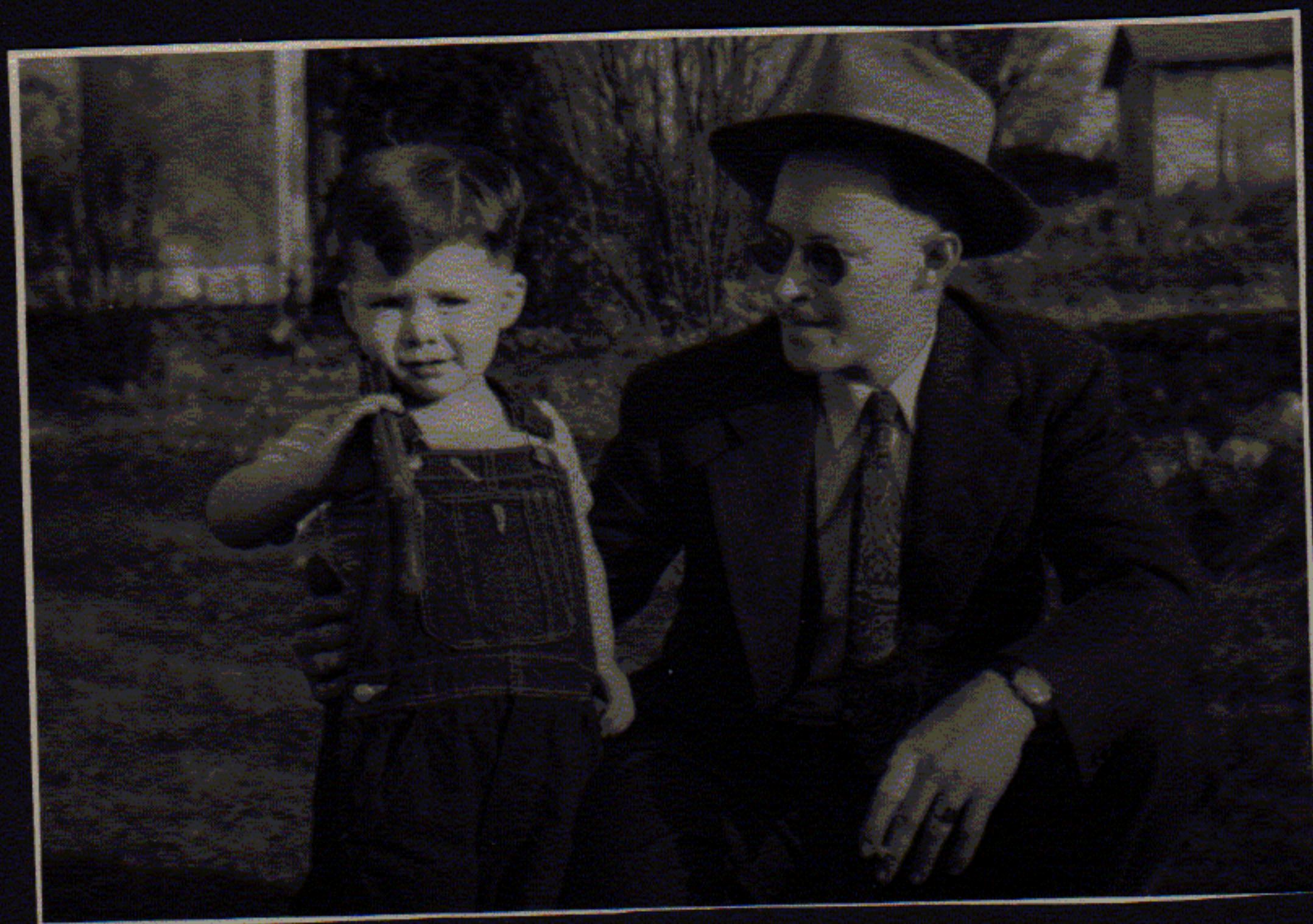
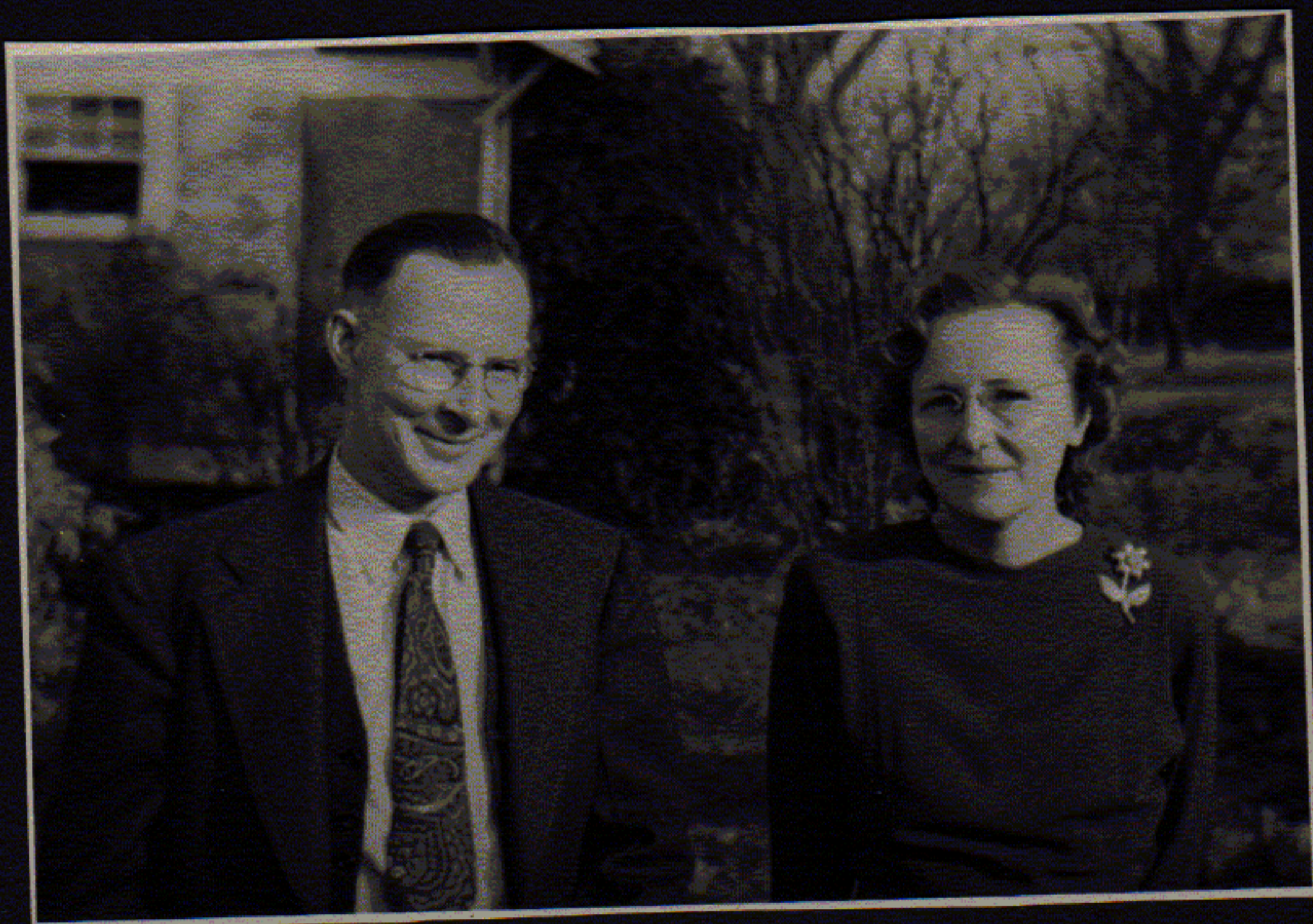
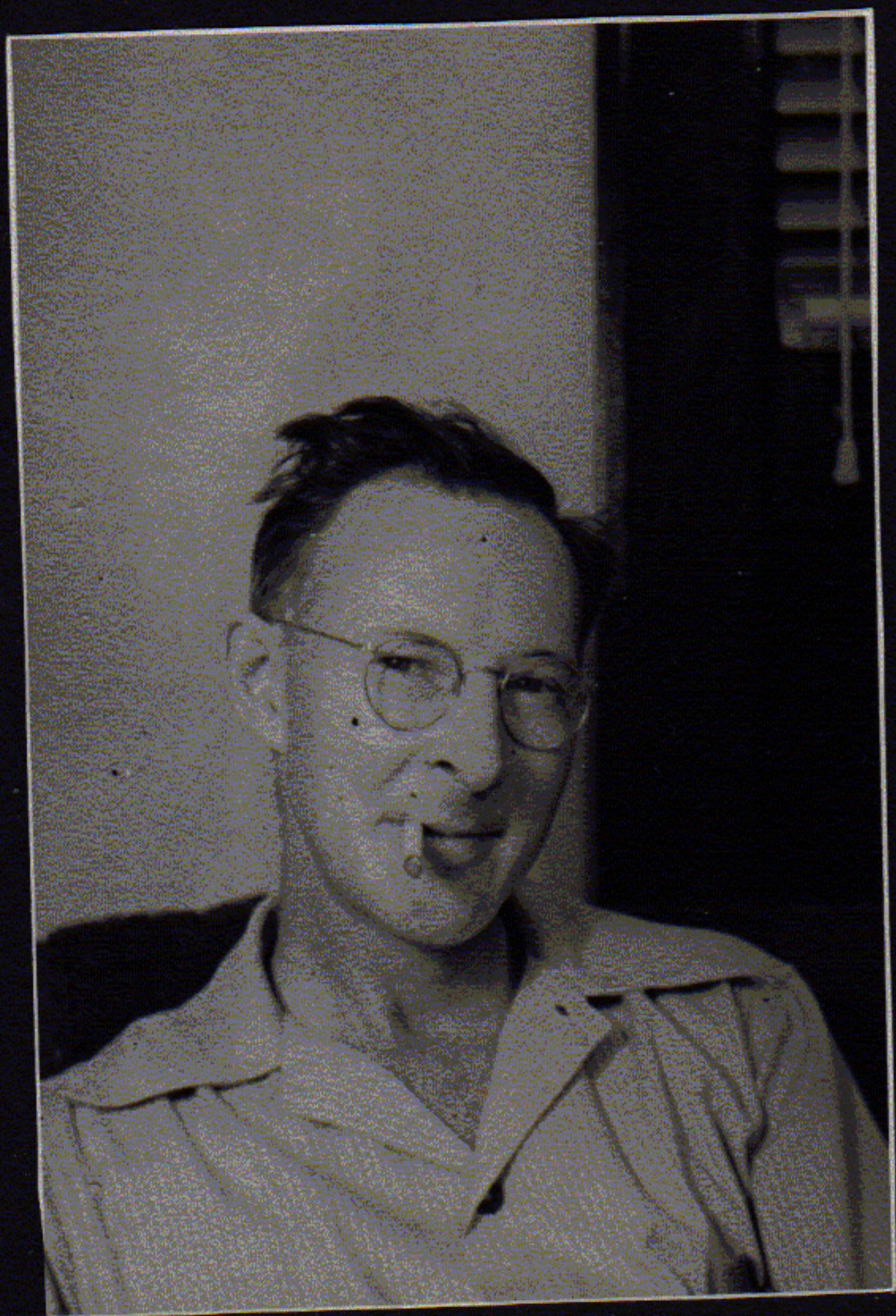
