Mercury, New York Gazette, North Carolina Gazette, Pennsylvania Gazette, South Carolina Gazette, Ipswich Journal (England, 1721), The Weekly Journal (London, 1715), and The Post Boy (London) ca. 1704 is the earliest use found. 1
